This spring, City of Red Deer recreation facilities are operating without additional public health restrictions. The City of Red Deer continues to work with RDMBA to complete the construction of two new competitive baseball diamonds north of the West Park Middle school.

Phase 1 of the project is now complete as most of the site grading work, fencing and underground utility work is finished. Phase 2 of the project will commence spring 2022 where grass sod will be installed in the fields as well as score boards, dugouts and base line material. RDMBA, West Park Middle School and The City of Red Deer are excited to gain these two new baseball field assets.



Meet our Olympians

Maddison Pearman - Speed Skating

Maddison Pearman, a member of the Red Deer Lions Speed Skating Club since 2001, is currently competing at the Olympics in Beijing. Maddi has been focused on this goal for some time. Her accolades include a gold at the 2008 Alberta Winter Games, and participation in numerous National Championships including the 2011 Canada Winter Games in Halifax, 2013 Junior World Championships in Italy, 2015 Junior World Championships in Poland, and the 2021 World Cup in Calgary. Maddi's placement at the World Cup in Salt Lake City this fall solidified her place on the Canadian Women's Long Track Team. Congratulations on making it to your first Olympics and making Central Alberta proud!

Jocelyn Peterman - Curling

In the winter of 2011, Red Deer's Jocelyn Peterman was at a curling camp and got a visit from Olympian Cheryl Bernard. Bernard skipped Canada to silver at the 2010 Olympics in Vancouver and came out to speak to the young curlers. Peterman was a teenager at the time but distinctly remembers what one coach told the group after that meeting.

Come full circle 11 years later and Jocelyn Peterman made her Olympic debut at Beijing 2022. She joined Team Jones in 2017-18. Team Jones — which includes skip Jennifer Jones, third Kaitlyn Lawes, second Jocelyn Peterman, lead Dawn McEwen, headed to China as one of the favourites in the field.



G.H. Dawe Expansion Project

Foundations are complete on the GH Dawe facility and we are eagerly awaiting the arrival of the precast panels which should be starting to roll in soon.

Before precast goes up, there are various structural steel components that will need to be installed on site. We have recently completed the large task of removing a big precast beam. The work took place around the existing front entrance desk at the G.H. Dawe facility. CANA worked to ensure that the demolition happened safely for staff and patrons.

If you visit the site, you will see some shoring posts by the cashiers desk, this is the temporary structure that was installed to support the roof so that the beam could be demolished. A new steel beam will go in its place very soon and the temporary shoring will be removed. We've continued with electrical and mechanical rough-in work and started slab preparation for one of the new rink surfaces.
